MusicRow Magazine is proud to reveal the nominees for the 2021 *MusicRow* Awards. This year's honors will be announced virtually on Thursday, August 19 and are presented by City National Bank.

Now in its 33rd year, the *MusicRow* Awards are Nashville's longest running music industry trade publication honors and celebrate the achievements of songwriters, artists, producers, and more.

The 11 awards categories are voted on by subscribed members of *MusicRow* Magazine.

The final nominees revealed in this announcement are determined by a committee comprised of critics and tastemakers. For the categories of Breakthrough Songwriter and Breakthrough Artist-Writer, outside nominations are also taken into consideration. For the Male and Female Songwriter of the Year categories, nominees are based on data from *MusicRow*'s Top Songwriter Chart. All nominations are based on projects that were active between the period of June 1, 2020 through May 31, 2021.

Continuing *MusicRow*'s longstanding tradition of recognizing behind-the-scenes excellence, the Top 10 Album All-Star Musician Awards will be presented in conjunction with the *MusicRow* Awards. These honors salute Nashville's most indemand studio players who performed on the most albums

reaching the Top 10 of *Billboard*'s Top Country Albums chart during the eligibility period.

MusicRow Subscribed Members will vote to determine award winners. The Ballot Voting Period runs Wednesday, July 14 at 11 a.m. through Friday, July 23 at 5 p.m.

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

PRODUCER OF THE YEAR: About the Nominees

Dave Cobb lent his production talents to a wide swath of artists, ranging from the traditional country sounds of Chris Stapleton to rock band Kaleo to Americana heroes Jason Isbell & The 400 Unit. Among his recent hits are Stapleton's "Starting Over" from the ACM Album of the Year by the same name. Cobb worked on the heralded album by The Highwomen, and with icons John Prine, Barry Gibb and The Oak Ridge Boys, as well as the talents of A Thousand Horses, Anderson East, Blackberry Smoke, Dawes, Lukas Nelson & Promise of the Real, Randy Rogers Band, and Travis Tritt. Cobb was nominated for Producer of the Year, Non-Classical at the 63rd Grammy Awards. He is a two-time *MusicRow* Producer of the Year.

Ross Copperman is co-producer of Gabby Barrett's blockbuster debut album *Goldmine*, home to the hits "I Hope" and "The Good Ones." Over the last year Copperman also had hits including Darius Rucker's "Beers and Sunshine," and worked with newcomers Bexar and King Calaway. He produced new music by Darius Rucker ("My Masterpiece"), Brad Paisley ("City of Music") and Michael Ray ("Picture"). Copperman's own recent EP, *Somewhere There's A Light On*, is out now via Photo Finish Records. This is his fourth nomination for *MusicRow* Producer of the Year.

Corey Crowder enters the Producer of the Year category for the first time in 2021, thanks to numerous hits including Chris Young and Kane Brown's "Famous Friends," Tim McGraw and Tyler Hubbard's "Undivided," and Florida Georgia Line's "Long Live." His credits also include FGL's 6-Pack EP, Chris Tomlin & Friends and Chase Rice's "Drinkin' Beer. Talkin' God. Amen." featuring FGL. Crowder re-upped with Tree Vibez Music in late 2020, where he produces artists including Brian Kelley and RaeLynn, and also released his own song as an artist.

Dann Huff is the producer and/or co-producer of Kane Brown's "Worldwide Beautiful" and "Cool Again," Russell Dickerson's "Love You Like I Used To" and "Home Sweet," and Brett Young's "Lady." He also worked with *MusicRow* Artist of the Year nominee Thomas Rhett on "What's Your Country Song" and "Country Again," and produced Lady A's current single "Like A Lady," and Rascal Flatts' "How They Remember You." Additional credits include Brantley

Gilbert, Brad Paisley, Danielle Bradbery, Dillon Carmichael, Heath Sanders, Lanco, Lindsay Ell, Noah Schnacky, Restless Road, Robert Counts, and Ross Ellis. Huff has been voted *MusicRow* Producer of the Year for the last two years, and is an overall four-time winner.

Jay Joyce produced recent hits by Eric Church ("Stick That In Your Country Song," "Hell Of A View"), and Brothers Osborne ("I'm Not For Everyone"), as well as Miranda Lambert's Grammy-winning album *Wildcard*. In addition, "Hell Of A View" is nominated for *MusicRow* Awards Song of the Year, while Church and Lambert are nominated for *MusicRow* Awards Artist of the Year. Joyce also produced acclaimed artist Brandy Clark, and newcomer Lainey Wilson, who is in the running for Discovery Artist of the Year. He also has credits on fresh tracks from Charlie Worsham, Declan McKenna, Devin Dawson, Kip Moore and Tenille Townes. Joyce is a two-time *MusicRow* Producer of the Year.

Joey Moi produced one of 2021's most-streamed albums, *Dangerous: The Double Album* by Morgan Wallen. Moi, a partner at Big Loud, also produced many of the company's other artists including Chris Lane, Ernest, Hardy, Jake Owen, Larry Fleet, Lily Rose, MacKenzie Porter, and Sean Stemaly. This includes hits by Lane ("Big, Big Plans"), Owen ("Homemade," "Made for You") and Hardy ("One Beer," "Give Heaven Some Hell"). Hardy's "Give Heaven Some Hell" is nominated for *MusicRow* Song of the Year. This is Moi's second nomination for Producer of the Year.







BREAKTHROUGH SONGWRITER: About the Nominees

Matt Alderman has a recent hit as a co-writer and coproducer of "Nobody" recorded by Dylan Scott. Perfect for summer, he's also a writer on the sunny new single from Dustin Lynch and Chris Lane, "Tequila On A Boat." This follows previous cuts by Clare Dunn, Matt Stell, Brett Young and Jake Owen.

Benjy Davis and fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominees Joey Hyde and Neil Medley teamed up to write the hit song "Made For You," recorded by Jake Owen. Davis has a track record of cuts by Dan + Shay, Eli Young Band, Josh Abbott Band, Rascal Flatts, and Chris Young.

Nicolette Hayford had her first hit as a co-writer of the award-winning song "One Night Standards," recorded by Ashley McBryde. Hayford's other McBryde credits include "Little Dive Bar In Dahlonega," "Shut Up Sheila," "Voodoo Doll" and "Sparrow." Additionally Hayford has recent cuts by Chrissy Metz and Kylie Morgan.

Joey Hyde scored his first hit with "Made For You," cowritten with fellow nominees Benjy Davis and Neil Medley, and recorded by Jake Owen. Hyde's credits include the new single by Walker Montgomery and recordings by Luke Dick, Sam Grow, Lindsay Ell, and Ryan Hurd.

Dan Isbell earned his first hit as a co-writer of "Better Together" recorded by Luke Combs. He wrote the song with Combs, who is nominated for *MusicRow* Artist of the Year, and Randy Montana, who is nominated for Male Songwriter of the Year. Isbell also has new cuts by Flatland Cavalry, Kameron Marlowe, Laine Hardy, Matt Stell, Tucker Beathard and Scotty McCreery.

Greylan James was honored when his first hit single "Happy Does" was recorded by one of his heroes, Kenny Chesney. James is a Knoxville native with other cuts by Chris Young, Chris Janson, Drake White, and Alexander Ludwig.

Alex Kline is part of the first all-female team to write, perform and produce a No. 1 country radio single, with

Tenille Arts' "Somebody Like That." Accordingly, Kline is also nominated for Female Songwriter of the Year. She has previous cuts by Ronnie Dunn, Reba McEntire, Mitchell Tenpenny, Gary Allan, Terri Clark, and Cassadee Pope, as well as numerous production credits. Kline wrote the song with Arts, who is nominated for two *MusicRow* Awards, and Allison Veltz Cruz, who is also nominated for Female Songwriter of the Year.

Chris La Corte scored his first hit with "Breaking Up Was Easy in the '90s" recorded by Sam Hunt, from the album Southside. La Corte is the first writer signed to Hang Your Hat Music, Hillary Lindsey's partnership with Concord. He also has a new cut by Andrew Jannakos.

Emily Landis charted her first hit as a co-writer of "The Good Ones" recorded by Gabby Barrett. Landis is a graduate of Belmont University where she studied songwriting and has other cuts by Smithfield, Carolyn Miller, Eric Paslay and Kassi Ashton.

Michael Lotten earned his first hit with "Momma's House" recorded by Dustin Lynch. This follows cuts by Mitchell Tenpenny ("Alcohol You Later"), Jon Langston ("All Eyes On Us"), Dylan Schneider, Chuck Wicks, Willie Jones, and Sam Grow.

James McNair has had several Luke Combs cuts and scored a hit with Combs' recording of "Lovin' On You." Other artists who have recorded McNair's songs include Kylie Morgan, Chase Rice, RaeLynn, The Cadillac Three, Chris Janson, Scotty McCreery, Morgan Wallen and Craig Campbell.

Neil Medley teamed with Benjy Davis and Joey Hyde to write "Made For You," a hit for Jake Owen. He has had previous singles by Lindsay Ell ("I Don't Love You") and Josh Abbott Band ("Wasn't That Drunk"). Medley also has cuts by Hailey Whitters, Tiera, CJ Solar, Cody Johnson, Luke Bryan, Kid Rock, and Brent Cobb.

Jordan Minton is a co-writer of Niko Moon's hit "Good



Time," along with fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominees Anna Moon, Joshua Murty, and Mark Trussell. He has cuts on Keith Urban's *Graffiti U* record, as well as by Dan + Shay, Trent Harmon, Abby Anderson and Mitchell Tenpenny's track "Telling All My Secrets."

Jake Mitchell is the only nominee in this category with two qualifying songs: "Some Girls" recorded by Jameson Rodgers, and "One Beer" recorded by Hardy ft. Lauren Alaina and Devin Dawson. He co-wrote the title track to Luke Bryan's current album *Born Here Live Here Die Here*, and has other cuts by Dawson, Rodgers, Ashley McBryde, Ashley Monroe, Matt Stell, Chrissy Metz, Florida Georgia Line and CJ Solar.

Anna Moon co-wrote "Good Time" with fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominees Joshua Murty and Mark Trussell, and Breakthrough Artist nominee Niko Moon. Anna Moon contributed multiple songs to her husband's debut project.

Joshua Murty teamed with Anna Moon, Niko Moon, Jordan Minton, and Mark Trussell to write Niko's hit "Good Time." They collaborated on much of the EP, with Murty co-producing. Murty's career includes time as a touring guitarist with Maren Morris.

Mitch Oglesby scored his first hit with Chris Janson's recording of "Done." The song was co-written with Janson, Jamie Paulin and fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominee Matt Roy. Oglesby has multiple cuts by Janson, as well as artists Cody Johnson, Tyler Booth, and Styles Haury.

Matt Roy earned his first hit with Chris Janson's "Done," cowritten with Janson, Jamie Paulin and fellow Breakthrough Songwriter nominee Mitch Oglesby. Roy also has cuts by Chris Young, Alexander Ludwig, and Kane Brown.

Mark Trussell is a co-writer of the Niko Moon hit "Good Time," which he penned with Niko, Anna Moon, Jordan Minton, and Joshua Murty. Trussell also has recordings by Chris Lane ("Fill Them Boots"), Keith Urban ("Polaroid"), Devin Dawson ("Range Rover"), Billy Currington ("Details"), Maren Morris ("RSVP") and many others.

Dallas Wilson, Matt Alderman, and Dylan Scott penned Scott's hit single "Nobody," which earned Breakthrough Songwriter nominations for Wilson and Alderman. Among Wilson's other co-writes are cuts by Mitchell Tenpenny, Lainey Wilson, Jimmie Allen, Dylan Scott and Karl Michael. He is the son of studio musician and songwriter Lonnie Wilson.



BREAKTHROUGH ARTIST-WRITER: About the Nominees

Tenille Arts had a history-making single with "Somebody Like That." Written by Arts, Allison Veltz Cruz and Alex Kline, it is the first country song performed and produced entirely by females to reach No 1. This success earned the trio multiple *MusicRow* Awards nominations. Arts was selected for the CMT Next Women of Country Class of 2021, and was nominated for ACM New Female Artist of the Year. This summer she'll be working her follow-up single "Back Then, Right Now" and hitting the road with Lady A.

Ben Johnson of trio Track45 has two qualifying songs which earned him a nomination for Breakthrough Artist-Writer: "Gone" recorded by Dierks Bentley, and "One Of Them Girls" recorded by Lee Brice. His chart action during the eligibility period also includes "All My Favorite Songs" by Weezer which was a hit on the Adult Alternative Airplay chart. Johnson's other cuts include "Believe" by Meek Mill and Justin Timberlake, "On Me" by Thomas Rhett and Kane Brown ft. Ava Max, "Hot Beer" by Dillon Carmichael, and "Give Heaven Some Hell," by Hardy, which is nominated for *MusicRow* Awards Song of the Year. Johnson also coproduced Kylie Morgan's debut EP.

Chris Lane scored his first No. 1 as a songwriter with "Big Big Plans." He wrote the song with Jacob Durrett and Ernest Keith Smith, a fellow nominee for Breakthrough Artist-Writer. Lane's previous hits as a recording artist were outside cuts including "I Don't Know About You," "Fix," and "Take Back Home Girl" ft. Tori Kelly. Lane is following the success of "Big Big Plans" with new single, "Fill Them Boots," and a tour of the same name. He also dropped the tracks "Summer Job Money," "That's What Mamas Are For," and is featured on Dustin Lynch's "Tequila On A Boat."

Ashley McBryde is a co-writer of her hit single "One Night Standards" along with Nicolette Hayford and Shane McAnally, marking her first entry into the top 10 as a songwriter, despite her notable past success. The song was released on Sept. 23, 2019, as the lead-off single to her second studio album, Never Will, and peaked at radio a year later. McBryde is the 2019 MusicRow Breakthrough Artist of the Year. Her co-writes have been recorded by artists including Chrissy Metz, Carly Pearce, Dan Smalley and Shy Carter. McBryde returns to the road this summer,

including her first headlining shows at the historic Ryman Auditorium.

Parker McCollum earned his first No. 1 at country radio with "Pretty Heart," which received RIAA Platinum certification and was featured on his *Hollywood Gold* EP, the highest-selling debut country EP of 2020. McCollum's year of many highlights includes numerous sold-out shows, and his debut performance on the Grand Ole Opry. His full-length major label debut album, *Gold Chain Cowboy*, is set for release July 30. McCollum wrote "Pretty Heart" with frequent collaborator Randy Montana, who is the reigning *MusicRow* Breakthrough Songwriter and is in the running for Male Songwriter of the Year this year.

Ernest K. Smith scored an impressive five qualifying hits during the eligibility period. His cuts include "Big Big Plans," which also earned a Breakthrough Artist-Writer nomination for Chris Lane. Smith also co-wrote Sam Hunt's "Breaking Up Was Easy in the '90s," Florida Georgia Line's "I Love My Country," Morgan Wallen's "More Than My Hometown" and "Heartless" recorded by Diplo ft. Morgan Wallen. Smith contributed eleven tracks to Wallen's *Dangerous: The Double Album.* He has Lane's current single "Fill Them Boots," FGL's "Blessings," and Zayn's "Tightrope," as well as his own new single "American Rust."

SONG OF THE YEAR: About the Nominees

"Black Like Me"

"If you think we live in the land of the free / you should try to be Black like me." It is a powerful sentiment delivered by Mickey Guyton's equally powerful voice. The song was written by Guyton in 2019 at a cross-genre writing camp with Nathan Chapman, Emma Davidson-Dillon and Fraser Churchill. She released the recording in June 2020, making an important statement in a time of social unrest, and received widespread critical acclaim. Guyton's remarkable year included making history as the first Black female solo artist to earn a Grammy nomination in a country category, for Best Country Solo Performance for "Black Like Me," which she performed as part of the awards ceremony. In addition, she co-hosted the ACM Awards. This is her first MusicRow Awards nomination, and she is also nominated for Breakthrough Artist of the Year.

"Give Heaven Some Hell"

Penned by Hardy with Ashley Gorley, Ben Johnson, and Hunter Phelps, "Give Heaven Some Hell" is a song full of heart, grief and ultimately, hope. On first listen it could come across as a redneck ode to the afterlife—a good ole boy's dream of muddy fields, beer and clear, and hitting "gold streets on two-wheels." But a few more listens reveal depth below the surface, with imagery and rhyme ("Make some thunder / make 'em wonder how you got in") and references to classic hymns ("Amazing Grace," "Just As I Am"). Produced by Joey Moi with co-production by Derek Wells, it is from Hardy's debut album *A Rock* and is the follow-up single to his No. 1 hit "One Beer." Gorley is the reigning *MusicRow* Male Songwriter of the Year and is nominated again this year. Moi is vying for Producer of the Year and Johnson is up for Breakthrough Artist-Writer.

"Half Of My Hometown"

Written by Kelsea Ballerini, Shane McAnally, Ross Copperman, Jimmy Robbins, and Nicolle Galyon, it is a heartfelt tribute to hometowns, and the conflicting desires to stay or leave the place where you grew up. ("Stay or leave / part of me / will always be / half of my hometown"). For the recording Ballerini tapped fellow Knoxville native Kenny Chesney to add harmonies. It is from her self-titled third album *Kelsea*, which she co-produced with Copperman and Robbins. Copperman is nominated for *MusicRow* Producer of the Year and Male Songwriter, while Galyon is up for Female Songwriter. Ballerini recently attained her sixth No. 1 song with "Hole In The Bottle."

"Hell Of A View"

Eric Church is "chasing life instead of dollar bills" in his hit song "Hell Of A View." Co-written with longtime collaborators Casey Beathard and Monty Criswell, it's an endearing and rebellious love story about the stellar view from life on the edge. Delivered with classic Church conviction and backing vocals by powerhouse Joanna Cotten, he sings, "This ain't for everybody / Toes hanging off the ledge / Like we got nothin' to lose / Ain't always heaven, baby / This livin' on the edge / You holdin' me holdin' you / It's a hell of a view." It is his tenth No. 1 and is on his critically acclaimed new triple album *Heart & Soul*. This summer the reigning CMA Entertainer of the Year returns to the road with The Gather Again Tour.


"My Boy"

Elvie Shane proves that love and devotion transcend traditional family ties on his song "My Boy." Written about his stepson ("He's my son and that's my choice / he ain't my blood but he's my boy"), the song became a viral hit which resonated with many blended families. This led to a record deal with BBR, which released it as a single, where it is Top 20 on country radio. It is featured on the Kentucky native's debut EP, County Roads, which is chock full of blue-collar grit, vivid imagery and nostalgia delivered by Shane's soulful vocals. His breakout year includes his debut on the Grand Ole Opry, and being direct support for Jason Aldean at his first live concert in more than a year. This summer he will join Brooks & Dunn's 2021 Reboot Tour, Miranda Lambert's amphitheater dates, and anticipate the arrival of his baby girl.

"Next Girl"

Carly Pearce wrote this song of warning with hitmakers Shane McAnally and Josh Osborne. ("If he ever talks about the ex girl / she tried like hell / it was too late to save herself / so she's just trying to help the next girl...l know what happens next... girl"). It's a clever song found on Pearce's acclaimed album 29, which explores life after loss, and shows the songstress emerging from the ashes. Among her other recent successes are the hit "I Hope You're Happy Now," recorded with Lee Brice, and joining CCM artist Matthew West on a new version of his No. 1 "Truth Be Told." She was recently surprised by Dolly Parton with an invitation to become a member of the Grand Ole Opry, and will spend the summer touring with Lady A. Co-writer Osborne is nominated for Male Songwriter of the Year.

DISCOVERY ARTIST OF THE YEAR: About the Nominees

Priscilla Block makes music on her own terms offering fans an unfiltered, honest point of view. Her twangy vocals have a unique lilt as she veers from the vulnerability of "Just About Over You" and "Wish You Were The Whiskey," to the sass, self-love and humor of songs like "Thick Thighs" and "PMS." She boosted her fanbase by posting videos on TikTok during quarantine, with fans rallying together to fund her recording of "Just About Over You." (The song's radio version was produced by Producer of the Year nominee Ross Copperman.) Block is a North Carolina native who released her major label EP in April and recently brought her self-described "Block Party" sound to her Grand Ole Opry debut.

Tyler Braden is a songwriter and storyteller with a voice to be reckoned with and a commanding sound ready for an arena-sized audience. His latest release, "Ways To Miss You," is co-produced by Male Songwriter of the Year nominee Randy Montana and Mark Holman. This follows popular streaming releases including the solo-penned "Secret," a testament to this newcomer's songwriting talent. Braden is an Alabama native who spent seven years as a firefighter and first responder. His first major label release was a cover of Needtobreathe's "Brother" which paid tribute to those on the front lines and quickly racked up more than two million views on YouTube.

lan Munsick is a much-needed creative, adventurous addition to the country music landscape. Growing up on a ranch in Wyoming, Munsick played in a family band and his appreciation for the wide open west bleeds into his music. A multi-instrumentalist and songwriter, he spent the last decade honing his craft in Nashville. He co-wrote and co-produced his debut album *Coyote Cry* which he describes as a "handshake of the cowboy and the hippie, the traditional and the contemporary." It is a varied project ranging from the roots/acoustic single "Long Haul," to bluegrass territory, and even to a reimagined version of Fleetwood Mac's "Dreams."

Drew Parker is a country music traditionalist, offering a laid back song about heartbreak on his debut single "While You're Gone," which is already a fan favorite. (While his girl is gone he'll be on a tailgate by the lake with a Lucky

Strike, "kicking it with a BP PBR.") He co-wrote the song with Jameson Rodgers, who is nominated for *MusicRow* Breakthrough Artist of the Year. Parker has a knack for balancing heartbreak with imagery and humor throughout his EP, like the clever "Party In The Back" and the more vulnerable "The Runway." His unique perspective is found on hits he's co-written for Luke Combs ("Forever After All") and Jake Owen ("Homemade"). The Georgia native will be on tour with Combs later this summer.

Lily Rose has a stand-out voice rich with texture and made for radio. Her strong songwriting chops are found on viral hit "Villain" and "Overnight Sensation," which describes her success as being 13 years in the making. Her most recent track "Remind Me of You," is the first outside song she has released, because she says it struck her as the "perfect combination of swag and country." Rose grew up in Atlanta as a self-taught drummer, guitarist and singer. She continued performing while attending college in Athens, Georgia which led to sold out shows and prompted her move to Nashville in 2017. "Remind Me of You" is coproduced by Matt Morrisey and Producer of the Year nominee Joey Moi, and co-written by Sam Hunt, Ryan Vojtesak, and *MusicRow* Awards nominees Corey Crowder and Ernest Keith Smith.

Lainey Wilson is a tough-as-nails singer-songwriter who offers honesty with every lyric. Her debut album *Sayin'* What I'm Thinkin' is an aptly titled introduction for the twangy songstress with the long tresses. The highly-listenable project portrays her self-described brand of "bell bottom country" and is home to current single "Things A Man Oughta Know," and songs including "WWDD," which stands for "What would Dolly do?" The Louisiana native has co-written songs recorded by Luke Combs and others, has had placements in the television series *Yellowstone*, and graced the Grand Ole Opry stage. *Sayin' What I'm Thinkin'* is produced by Producer of the Year nominee Jay Joyce.

BREAKTHROUGH ARTIST OF THE YEAR: About the Nominees

Tenille Arts has had a stellar year, including her single "Somebody Like That" becoming the first No. 1 song in country music written, performed and produced by all females. A native of Weyburn, Saskatchewan, Arts is the first Canadian to reach No. 1 in the U.S. since 2007 and first Canadian female since Terri Clark in 2004. She also won the Rising Star award at the 2020 Canadian Country Music Association Awards. Arts is following up "Somebody Like That" with new single "Back Then, Right Now."

BRELAND is a talented addition to the country music family. His autobiographical hit "Cross Country" is a well-written song with the dual meanings of literally moving across the country, while also crossing genre lines. Known for frequently tapping guest collaborators, he upped the ante by adding Mickey Guyton to a new version of "Cross Country." With his career on the rise since his platinum debut song "My Truck" dropped in 2019, BRELAND has collaborated with Gary LeVox, Lauren Alaina, Chase Rice, and Sam Hunt, and most recently his second collaboration with Keith Urban on "Throw It Back." BRELAND will kick off his first headlining tour at Bonnaroo Music Festival on Sept. 5.

Mickey Guyton had a hard-earned, much-deserved breakthrough year. Her important songs "What Are You Gonna Tell Her?" and "Black Like Me" made listeners sit up and take notice. Guyton made history as the first Black female solo artist to earn a Grammy nomination in a country category, for Best Country Solo Performance for "Black Like Me" which she performed on the show. In addition, she teamed with Keith Urban to co-host this year's Academy of Country Music Awards. "Black Like Me" is nominated for MusicRow Song of the Year.

Parker McCollum is riding into the release of his full-length major label debut album with a No. 1 single and sold-out shows across the country. The upcoming project, Gold Chain Cowboy, was produced by the talented Jon Randall and features his No. 1 "Pretty Heart" and follow-up single "To Be Loved By You." McCollum is a perfectionistic songwriter with the talent of being able to convey a feeling while leaving the lyrics open to interpretation, such as on his just-released solo-write "Rest of My Life." He is also

nominated for MusicRow Breakthrough Artist-Writer.

Niko Moon scored his first No. 1 as an artist with debut single "Good Time." He followed that success with new release "No Sad Songs" and is finishing up his debut full-length album with longtime collaborator and co-producer Joshua Murty. Moon's track record is strong, with writing credits on five No. 1 hits for Zac Brown Band, plus cuts by Dierks Bentley, Ashley Monroe and others. His hit "Good Time" earned *MusicRow* Breakthrough Songwriter nominations for his four co-writers, including Murty.

Jameson Rodgers charted a No. 1 debut with "Some Girls" as well as his latest Top 20 and climbing hit "Cold Beer Calling My Name," which features labelmate Luke Combs. All are on his excellent new EP In It For The Money. The Mississippi native moved to Music City more than a decade ago, and in recent years his hard work has paid off as cowriter of hits for Florida Georgia Line ("Talk You Out of It") and Chris Lane ("I Don't Know About You"), as well as the title track of Luke Bryan's latest album Born Here Live Here Die Here. Rodgers is the reigning MusicRow Discovery Artist of the Year.

Luke Bryan is one of country music's most multifaceted personalities: perennial radio hitmaker, television star, touring juggernaut. He is currently riding the success of new single "Waves," the fifth single from Born Here Live Here Die Here (Deluxe Edition) and the follow up to the project's already four consecutive No. 1s. Among his other ongoing accomplishments are the recently wrapped fourth season as a celebrity judge on American Idol, and adding the 2021 ACM Entertainer of the Year trophy to his collection. Bryan is gearing up to hit the road for his Proud To Be Right Here Tour in July, as well as bringing back his Farm Tour this fall. His new ventures include his first headlining run of shows in Las Vegas in 2022, and the upcoming Luke Bryan: My Dirt Road Diary five-part docuseries. Since his debut, Luke Bryan has garnered 26 No. 1 hits.

Luke Combs recently notched his 11th consecutive No. 1 single with "Forever After All." It is also the 6th consecutive No. 1 from Combs' deluxe album, What You See Ain't Always What You Get. He is the reigning CMA and ACM Male Artist and Album of the Year winner. His massive fall headlining arena tour will feature a new in-the-round stage design. Combs will also perform his first ever headlining stadium show in Boone, North Carolina on September 4. Combs recently made history as the first artist to have their first two studio albums spend 25 weeks or more at No. 1 on Billboard's Top Country Albums chart—breaking Taylor Swift's previously held record at 24 weeks. Combs has been voted MusicRow Artist of the Year the last two years.

Eric Church is nominated in two categories this year: Artist of the Year and Song of the Year for "Hell Of A View." The talented songman recently tallied his 10th career No. 1 with "Hell Of A View," an endearing anthem about rebellious love featured on his critically acclaimed new triple album Heart & Soul. The project is the result of a month spent writing and recording a song per day while sequestered in rural North Carolina. The reigning CMA Entertainer of the Year returns to the road on his 55-city The Gather Again Tour where he will perform in-the-round sets for the first time in his career. Church's longtime producer, Jay Joyce, is nominated for MusicRow Producer of the Year.

Miranda Lambert shined with versatility this year: releasing the celebrated *The Marfa Tapes*, continuing the success of her *Wildcard* album, and embarking on a wild night with Elle King on their infectious collaboration, "Drunk (And I Don't Wanna Go Home)." Continuing to diversify, Lambert made history by becoming the first female country star to have a bar and restaurant on Broadway in Nashville when she opened Casa Rosa. She collaborated with Jack Ingram and Jon Randall on *The Marfa Tapes* and an accompanying film, which was recorded raw and loose with just a pair of microphones and an acoustic guitar. Lambert earned her third Grammy Award when *Wildcard* was named Best Country Album. *Wildcard* producer Jay Joyce, is nominated for *MusicRow* Producer of the Year.

Thomas Rhett transitioned from the pop/rock stylings of his previous albums with a return to his roots. *Country Again: Side A* was released on April 30, with *Side B* planned for release later this year. Lead single "What's Your Country Song" marks Rhett's 17th career No. 1 and 11th consecutive No. 1. Other hits from the album include "Country Again." Most recently Rhett dropped "Things Dads Do," teaming up with his dad Rhett Akins. His headlining The Center Point Road Tour kicks off on Aug. 13 with back-to-back nights in Orange Beach, Alabama. His producer Dann Huff is nominated for Producer of the Year.

Chris Stapleton released the acclaimed album *Starting Over* in November, launching both the album and the title track straight to No. 1. It is Stapleton's second chart-topping single as an artist following 2018's "Broken Halos." Produced by Grammy Award-winning producer Dave Cobb, the record won Album of the Year at the 56th ACM Awards. Cobb is also nominated for *MusicRow* Producer of the Year. Stapleton has returned to the road with his extensive All-American Road Show. Among his recent highlights are joining forces with fellow Grammy Award-winner H.E.R. for a special performance of her single, "Hold On," during the 2021 CMT Music Awards. Stapleton's newest single, "You Should Probably Leave," is Top 30 and climbing at country radio.
